DAY 01



JOHN 1:1-5

At Advent, we have the opportunity to remember Jesus. Unlike the gospel narratives of Matthew and Luke, which point to the beginning of Jesus's life on earth, John reminds us of the ultimate beginning – the beginning of all things.

John tells us that the Word (a title he uses to describe Jesus), was with God and was God, in the beginning. In other words, before the story of creation, Jesus was with God the Father, and Jesus is God. The story of Christmas is more than the story of a young couple, looking for lodging in a small town. It is the story of God himself entering into his own creation, humbling himself by taking on humanity — the vulnerable, dependent humanity of a baby.

You and I can celebrate Christmas, because when we remember Jesus, we remember that God has not left us alone in the dark. He is a shining light who was in the beginning and who will be with us in the end.

THANK GOD FOR SENDING HIS SON, JESUS, TO TAKE ON HUMAN FLESH AND BECOME LIKE US, SO THAT WE COULD SEE HIS LIGHT AND KNOW HIM.





Burdens! What a not-so-wonderful word! For most of us, this word carries a connotation of discomfort, stress, and pain. The weight of constantly making decisions about our family, our finances, and our futures is fatigue-inducing. But someone has to carry them! Who will manage the load, if we don't? While having responsibility and stewarding our lives will never go away, the heaviest obligation we shoulder has been removed from us forever.

In Isaiah, God promises that he will give to His Son (a child born for us) the government, responsibility, and dominion of over the oppressive burden of sin and its judgment, which hovers over our lives. His son's name is Jesus, our Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace. He will exchange our yoke of guilt and shame, with His burden of grace and peace that never ends. A yoke that is easy and a burden which is light (Matt. 28:30).

PRAY TODAY FOR A RENEWED SENSE OF GOD'S PEACE, AS YOU EXCHANGE YOUR CARES FOR HIS GRACE.

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DAY 03

ISAIAH 11:1-10

The story of Christmas does not begin with the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. In fact, the Advent season is a time to remember that God had planned to send Christ, the Chosen One of God, long ago. Even as early as Genesis 3, God promised that he would send one, who would make right the things that had gone wrong, because of Adam and Eve's disobedience in the Garden of Eden.

The One that God would send would be unique, special, chosen. He would be righteous and faithful to God. He would minister with the power of the Holy Spirit. He would bring justice for the meek and the poor. And He would usher in an era of peace in all creation — a peace founded on "the knowledge of the LORD."

The Christmas story is an extension of the story of the person that Isaiah prophesied would come, The Chosen One of God, righteous, faithful, and just — He who would restore all things.

PRAY TODAY FOR AREAS WHERE YOU NEED RESTORATION IN YOUR LIFE AND THE LIVES OF THOSE AROUND YOU.



DAY 04



JEREMIAH 33:14-16

Waiting is never easy. By nature, we are impatient people. Standing by, expecting someone or something to come along, which could change our lives forever, is an increasingly difficult "waiting room." And, it only intensifies when the surrounding circumstances are problematic and demanding. This place of waiting, in exile, is where we find the Israelites, and they must have been wondering if God would ever fulfill His promises to them.

In this passage, God assures them that He will raise up a king and a priest in the line of King David, fulfilling His promise to His people. Eventually, He does so through His Son, Jesus Christ. The Father makes a powerful statement here, declaring that He is faithful, consistent, and a covenant-keeping God. If you're in a "waiting room," and wondering whether God's promises are still true for you today, do not despair. God is with you and He does not change! "'Behold, days are coming,' declares the Lord, 'when I will fulfill the good word which I have spoken...'"

ASK GOD FOR HELP TO BELIEVE IN HIM AND TRUST THAT HE IS A MAN OF HIS WORD.

DAY 05



Zechariah and Elizabeth were two ordinary people used by God for an extraordinary purpose. Luke tells us that they both were righteous people who sought to obey God. Zechariah was a priest and diligently performed his duty. They loved each other and served God, even as they prayed for God to give them a baby. Elizabeth was unable to have a child. This was a painful reality for her, one that Zechariah prayed God would change.

God used these two ordinary people to prepare the way for His Son. As they lived an ordinary life and obeyed God, God prepared to change their lives forever. Soon he would turn their sadness into joy and fulfill their deepest desire.

ASK GOD TO HELP YOU FAITHFULLY OBEY HIM IN THE ORDINARY THINGS OF LIFE AND THAT YOUR LIFE BE CHARACTERIZED, AS RIGHTEOUS AND BLAMELESS, AND AN OPPORTUNITY TO PREPARE THE WAY FOR HIM.



DAY 06



LUKE 1:11-17

But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard..." Although he was startled, those words must have been sweet music to the ears of Zechariah at that moment. Given his age and the sheer impossibility of producing a child with his barren wife after years of trying, the thought of God finally providing a child for them would have been mind-blowing. God heard the prayer of Zechariah, and He responded!

We don't have a record of Zechariah and Elizabeth complaining about their unfortunate circumstances or blaming God for their infertility. But, we do have this written testimony of their persistent petition to God to intervene. They provide for us a great example of how we should respond to adversity in our lives. We should approach God's throne of grace with confidence (Heb. 4:16). It's in this place that we find the answers we so desperately need.

ASK GOD TODAY TO HELP YOU SEE HIM AS THE GOD OF THE IMPOSSIBLE - AND THAT YOU CAN APPROACH HIM WITH ANYTHING YOU NEED.

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DAY 07

LUKE 1:18-25

Zechariah had been praying. He had prayed for his wife's infertility to be healed and for them to have a child. It is likely that he had been praying for a long time. Somewhere along the lines, did his prayers change from the eager desires of a man, who trusted his God, to half-hearted prayers of doubt? Maybe he had begun to doubt that God heard him or even cared about him.

When the angel told Zechariah that God had heard his prayers, Zechariah's first response was cynicism. He was face-to-face with a powerful angel who stood in the presence of God and whose job it was to give Zechariah this message. But Zechariah did not believe him. Because of his doubt, Zechariah temporarily lost the ability to speak, perhaps so that his unbelief wouldn't infect others.

It's not hard to get jaded. The good news is that God did not change his mind. God had heard Zechariah's prayers, and even his unbelief wouldn't sway God from blessing this couple. Elizabeth would have a baby. And Zechariah would praise his God.

THANK GOD FOR HIS GRACIOUSNESS TOWARD YOU IN YOUR MOMENTS OF DOUBT. THANK HIM FOR HIS GOODNESS ALL THE TIME AND ASK FOR GREATER FAITH TO TRUST HIM.



DAY 08



LUKE 1:26-38

Mary was a teenage girl from a small town, Nazareth, that had a negative reputation throughout the region. She was engaged to a poor carpenter from the same village. Mary was not wealthy or well-educated. She was not famous or influential.

Mary was imperfect and relatively insignificant. Yet, God favored her, His presence was with her, and she was used by Him to transform humanity through the incarnation of Jesus Christ. Mary's story is incredible! She gained God's approval, not through her actions, but only because God reached down from Heaven, before the foundation of the world and put His grace upon her life. Mary didn't choose God! God chose Mary!

Her testimony is our testimony too! We don't deserve God's grace, nor can we earn His favor, yet He chose us in Christ. He is for us. He is with us. Nothing is impossible with our God!

PRAY THANKSGIVING TO GOD FOR HIS UNMERITED FAVOR IN OUR LIVES THROUGH HIS SON, JESUS CHRIST.





MATTHEW 1:18-21

Mary and Joseph were two regular people. Joseph pursued Mary and now she was betrothed to him. They were on their way to a lovely marriage, when God's plan intersected theirs. Joseph found out that Mary was pregnant and knew that it was not his child. So, he planned to do what he must, divorce Mary, though he sought to do so in a way that would do the least harm to her.

But God intersected his life again, sending an angel, who let him in on the secret— this baby was from God! And this baby would be a savior!

God's plans intersected with Mary and Joseph's plans. And even though Mary and Joseph were two regular people, God would use them in an extraordinary way to bring blessing to all people.

THANK OUR FATHER THAT HE USES REGULAR PEOPLE TO DO HIS WILL. ASK HIM TO HELP YOU RESPOND FAITHFULLY AND OBEDIENTLY WHEN HIS PLANS INTERSECT WITH YOURS.



DAY 10

MATTHEW 1.22-25



Joseph finds himself in a confusing and challenging situation. His fiancé is not only pregnant, but it's God's baby. Can you imagine the intensity of those conversations between him and Mary? Joseph could have walked away from the messiness of this unfortunate circumstance. It would have alleviated all of his anxiety, fears, and pressures. But his perspective changed once God revealed the purpose behind this major life interruption.

"All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken..." was a game-changer for Joseph. God's word and intention transformed his outlook. God was up to something greater than Joseph could ever imagine. Once his viewpoint shifted, he could readily obey God's word to him and Mary.

Be encouraged today, especially if you're contemplating how to divorce yourself from an unpleasant season of life. God is always up to something. He's working all things for good, and ultimately giving birth to more of Jesus in your life! That's always a good thing - and our great perspective!

ASK GOD FOR CLARITY IN HIS PURPOSE FOR YOU AND FOR EVERY SITUATION YOU'RE EXPERIENCING. PRAY FOR OTHERS YOU KNOW THAT ARE CURRENTLY FACING DIFFICULTIES.

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DAY 11

LUKE 1:39-45

After Mary received the extraordinary angelic report that she would be the mother of the Son of God, she went to visit her relative, Elizabeth, who was now pregnant despite her old age. The angel had told Mary that Elizabeth's pregnancy was confirmation of what God had promised to her.

Elizabeth confirmed the testimony of the angel, not only because she was pregnant, but also by her words to Mary: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!" God was confirming His promise to Mary, through the lives of others in her life.

As we celebrate Advent, we have the privilege of being testimonies of what God has done through Jesus Christ. While we may not have the same miraculous experience that Elizabeth had, we can tell our friends, family, and neighbors of how blessed Mary was, and how her child would be a blessing to the world.

LET YOUR LIFE SERVE AS A TESTIMONY OF GOD'S GOODNESS AND FAITHFULNESS TO HUMANITY. ASK GOD TO GIVE YOU OPPORTUNITIES TO TELL OTHERS ABOUT WHAT HE HAS DONE IN JESUS CHRIST.



DAY 12



LUKE 1:46-56

Mary's hymn of praise is awe-inspiring. She leaves no stone unturned as she describes God's character and ability. God is her Savior. He's mighty and holy! He's merciful and strong! He cares about the marginalized and the oppressed! God is a covenant-keeping God and is forever faithful to the promises in His word! He's truly worthy of being praised!

But don't miss the immediate context of Mary's praise break. She had just received a timely and encouraging word of blessing from her cousin, Elizabeth. When Mary's world was turned upside down, God led her to a person of faith that stirred up a fresh awakening in her soul.

Don't spend this Christmas season alone. Pursue an authentic biblical community that will push you toward the presence of God and all He has to offer. Join a small group, participate in a Bible study, or maybe connect with a close friend over coffee. Like Mary, then may the eyes of your heart be opened to the glory of your Savior.

PRAY FOR DIVINE OPPORTUNITIES TO STRENGTHEN RELATIONSHIPS WITH THE SPIRITUAL FAMILY IN YOUR SPHERE OF INFLUENCE.

DAY 13



People celebrate Christmas with a plethora of traditions – Santa and his elves, Christmas trees, bells and ornaments. It can be easy to forget that the Advent is a story wrapped up in history. Luke works hard to let us know the setting of the story of Christmas. As he reports, Joseph and Mary were traveling to Joseph's hometown of Bethlehem to be part of a census.

Luke shows us that Jesus came into the world under humble circumstances. There was no marching band or grand coronation for a king. Joseph and Mary did not travel to Rome to deliver the next great Caesar. No, Jesus would be born in Bethlehem, the humble town of King David, the place of prophecy — and a place of promise.

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Lord, we may be encouraged to remember that God is willing to enter into our humble circumstances. And we can remember that although some aspects of Christmas are fanciful or fictional, our faith rests on the birth of Christ, which was incredibly and historically real.

THANK GOD THAT HE ENTERED INTO HUMAN HISTORY TO ESTABLISH HIS SALVATION IN THE VERY REAL LIFE OF HIS SON, JESUS CHRIST.





Jesus is the all-knowing, all-powerful King of Kings and Lord of Lords, and the Creator of everything. Jesus is God! He could have stepped into humanity as Superman. Yet, He introduced himself to us as a helpless newborn baby.

And talk about humble beginnings! He was born more like a peasant than a king. His castle was a stable, and his crib was a horse trough. It's not the entrance anyone would have envisioned for a Savior. Nevertheless, God's ways are much higher than our ways!

From the very beginning of Jesus' earthly story and ministry, God creates a seismic shift in our understanding of king and kingdom. His kingdom is spiritual, not material. It's eternal, not temporal. His great Sermon on the Mount reinforces that truth, as Jesus begins with this statement in Matthew 5:3: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Let's shift our focus today away from the things our world treasures and place our attention on the things our God values.

PRAY FOR AN INCREASED HUNGER FOR GOD'S WORD AND TO HELP YOU LAY ASIDE ANYTHING THAT WOULD DISTRACT YOU FROM HIS PRESENCE.

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DAY 15

LUKE 2:8-12

During Christmastime, nativity scenes often depict shepherds gathered around Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus. It is worth noting that according to Luke's Gospel, God chose shepherds to be the first recipients of the good news that a savior had been born.

Why shepherds? Why not government officials or world leaders? Why these dirty, ceremonially unclean men in the wilderness? Perhaps God was preparing the way for those on the margins of the society to be the first to hear the good news of God's salvation. Consider the words Jesus would later say in Matthew 20:16, "the last will be first and the first will be last."

On this momentous night, God was inviting those who had been cast out to be the first to witness the glorious reality that God was entering his own creation as a baby, who would be the savior of the world.

THANK GOD THAT HE OFFERS SALVATION AND ETERNAL LIFE TO ALL WHO WOULD COME, ESPECIALLY THE LOWLY, THE POOR, AND THE OUTCAST.



DAY 16

LUKE 2:13-14



It's a rare occurrence in the Bible, when God suddenly and supernaturally enters the scene. The angel's sudden appearance to the shepherds in the field was truly significant. Jesus' birth was such a momentous occasion that Heaven couldn't restrain its excitement. The doors of God's exuberant house party swing open, and we get a glimpse of Heaven's reaction.

The angelic multitude is singing loudly, praising Jesus, declaring His divinity, and describing His ministry. All who were enemies of God can now attain peace through His son, Jesus Christ. The kingdom of God is near, and salvation has come for all who would believe.

This fresh outpouring of praise from Heaven should inform our own response to God's presence in our lives. Let us begin to worship our God, who is truly worthy of praise. As we lift Him up, the peace of Christ, which transcends all understanding, will be our experience this Christmas season.

TAKE A MOMENT TODAY TO SPEND SOME TIME WITH GOD IN WORSHIP. AS YOU WORSHIP, ASK GOD FOR A GREATER SENSE OF HIS PEACE IN YOUR LIFE.

DAY 17



LUKE 2:15-18

What an amazing thing the shepherds had just experienced! They were witnesses to angels, messengers of heaven. First it was just one announcing the coming of the Savior, and then a multitude of angels appeared, praising God and singing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

Can you imagine the overwhelming nature of this supernatural experience? They had heard the good news that Jesus was born in a nearby village by a chorus of angelic beings! With an experience like that, you and I might be tempted to revel in the moment. But in an expression of guileless faith, these shepherds quickly travel to Bethlehem to see the baby.

And there, they see the real miracle wrapped in absolute ordinary life — a little baby swaddled up and lying in a manger. But this moment represented the most extraordinary reality of all of existence! God had come to dwell with us!

THANK YOU GOD FOR HIS PRESENCE IN THE ORDINARY MOMENTS OF YOUR LIFE AND FOR HIS SON, WHOSE LIFE IS THE EXTRAORDINARY MEETING THE ORDINARY FOR YOUR GOOD.





In this moment, we find a beautiful expression of a mother's love, after giving birth. As Christian parents, we partner with God and are deeply aware that our children are gifts from God. Mary rejoiced in her child's birth, but she was also consciously aware of his mission. Can you just imagine Mary's expectations for her son's life? She pondered this heavily in her heart and mind. At the time of Jesus' birth, Mary likely did not fully comprehend the magnitude of what had been prophesied for His life. Yet she received it in faith, trusted God, and waited patiently until it would be made clearer.

In this unusual time, many parents are experiencing anxiety and worry about their children — about their health, their education, and their future. To expel worry from our hearts, we must learn to trust God the way that Mary did. We must look back at God's faithfulness and His sovereign care, in order to trust Him, even in the midst of these unprecedented times.

PRAY FOR GOD TO HELP YOU LIVE BY FAITH, NOT BY SIGHT, AND WAIT PATIENTLY FOR HIS PLANS - JUST AS MARY DID.





Long before that night in Bethlehem, the prophet Micah prophesied that a ruler, who would bring peace for his people, would come from the city of David.

Bethlehem Ephrathah is the ancient name for the city of Bethlehem where King David was born. From that same city, another king would come who was from "ancient days," and who would shepherd his flock in the strength of the Lord.

Jesus is both the good Shepherd and our great King. Just as his birth joined the human and divine nature in a single person, so also His purposes, as shepherd and king, were joined in a single person. We celebrate Christmas because we have a Savior who rules and reigns, and also guards and protects.

DAY 20

MATTHEW 2:1-2



The Magi were men with varied interests in astrology, history, and magic, who sought all types of knowledge and revelation. Their search for the truth ultimately directed them toward the "king of the Jews." It would seem that these men had read the Jewish Scriptures and were persistently looking for a clue that would lead to Him. Finally, God provided a sign, through a rising star, that signaled the fulfilling end of their search.

"Where is He? Where is the newborn King?" they asked with great expectation and with hearts prepared to worship. These "wise men" displayed a level of faith that few Jewish religious leaders expressed during that time.

Their story poses a few thought-provoking questions. Are we actively pursuing Jesus? Are we following the signs that would lead us to Him? And if so, what will we do when He reveals himself to us? Will we devote ourselves to Him?

The great news is, if you're looking, seeking, or searching for answers, they can be found in Him. Jesus is the ultimate risen star and the light of the world. As you see Him more clearly, worship Him with your whole heart.

DAY 21



MATTHEW 2:3-6

King Herod overhead the chief priests and scribes talking about Jesus being born the King of the Jews, and he is troubled, because he feels a sense of threat to his throne. And these Jewish leaders were also distressed because Jesus would pose a threat to their corrupt religious and political leadership in Jerusalem. Matthew later describes Jesus as a ruler "who will shepherd my people." What a contrast in the leadership character between Jesus and these other leaders!

We can easily get a sense that these other leaders were prideful and only thought about themselves and their own interests. In contrast, throughout the Bible, Jesus is referred to as a shepherd who gently and tenderly cares for each one of us — even when we wander.

We all desire to have someone who honestly cares for and deeply loves us. In all of our needs, concerns, and disappointments, this can be found when we look to the one who faithfully cares and loves us. During this Christmas season, let's consider whether we are following our Shepherd, the One who has loved us so dearly that He died on the cross to save us.

THANK YOUR GOOD SHEPHERD FOR HIS NEVERENDING FAITHFULNESS AND GENTLE, TENDER LOVING CARE.



DAY 22



MATTHEW 2:7-8

Matthew tells of clear opposing intentions between the Magi and King Herod. On one hand, the Magi were convinced of the prophecy that the "King of the Jews" was born. They were excited to take a journey, following the star in the night sky, to honor and pay homage to Him. Their intentions were filled with veneration, wonder, and joy.

On the other hand, King Herod secretly tried to trick the Magi to return to him with information that could be used to find and kill Jesus. Herod perceived this newborn child to be his rival! His intentions were contaminated with pride, envy, and fear.

Rather than cooperating with the wicked Herod, the wise men slipped away, and an angel appeared to Joseph and warned him to flee Bethlehem.

When we find ourselves in the midst of adversity, or find it hard to figure out where our life is going, we also can count on our faithful God to be the guiding light that leads us. "Do not lean on your own understanding but acknowledge Him in all your ways and He will make your path straight to Him." (Prov. 3:5-6)

PRAY FOR GOD'S CHARACTER AND ATTRIBUTES TO SHINE GLORIOUSLY IN YOUR NIGHT SKY – AND BE * * YOUR GUIDING LIGHT.

DAY 23

MATTHEW 2:9-12

The Magi's role in the story of Jesus' birth is astounding. Although they were pagans who wouldn't usually believe in the one true God of the Jews, their faith and trust in Jesus, the newborn king, should inspire us all. These men traveled, guided by a single star in the sky, searching for the Lord. When they found him, they immediately fell to their knees and worshipped in His presence. The Magi devoted not only their words, but they gave an offering of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to Jesus.

Their example demonstrates how we should seek after God and worship Him. When we are faced with the reality and presence of Jesus, our proper response is to recognize His holiness and honor Him. Paul says, "Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God - this is our true and proper worship." (Rom. 12:1)

This Christmas, as we reflect on God's great gift of His Son, Jesus Christ. Let's respond with true worship to God by offering over our lives.

THANK GOD FOR HIS MERCY OFFERED THROUGH JESUS. ASK GOD TO HELP TO REMOVE ANY IDOLS PREVENTING YOU FROM FULLY DEVOTING YOUR LIFE TO HIM.

DAY 24



JOHN1:14

The first verse of John's gospel, he describes Jesus definitively, as the Word who was there in the beginning, who was with God, and who was God. These statements declare who He was, is, and always will be. As we continue reading chapter 1, John begins to explain the incarnation of the Word. He has always been God, but now He has become flesh. Herein lies the true reason for the season. Our Creator-God decided to step into humanity and dwell among us. It is the ultimate climax of the Christmas story!

There is no greater glory ever revealed to us than the person of Jesus. The only - begotten Son of God coming into the womb of a virgin, being born a baby, dressed in our fleshly limitations, experiencing our weaknesses, and laying down His perfect life to free us from our imperfections. Paul, in Ephesians 1:5, defines this as a "... glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves."



The celebration of Christmas is a great reminder of the expansive gift of God's free grace offered to us through Jesus Christ. John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Consider Romans 8:32, "He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things?" God's grace not only saves us but also is available to help us in every area of our lives.

This Christmas Eve, allow the grace of God through the truth of these Scriptures inspire you to worship our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, in spirit and truth, and to trust Him with your life.

THANK GOD FOR THE GIFT OF GRACE THAT HE'S GIVEN TO YOU THROUGH JESUS CHRIST. ASK HIM INTO YOUR HEART IF YOU HAVEN'T DONE SO ALREADY. PRAY THAT GOD WOULD HELP YOU TRUST HIM WITH EVERY PART OF YOUR LIFE.



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
